Dear Friends, Last Sunday I reminded all that as disciples of Jesus we're called to pray: prayer should be part of our daily lives. We are in the Year of St Luke as we journey with Jesus to Jerusalem and his death on the Cross. St Luke tells us how Jesus spent the whole night long in prayer in communion with his Father before he summoned his disciples and picked out twelve of them. Again, on the mountain he prayed with Peter, James and John and in the Garden of Gethsemane before his Passion. As he suffered on the Cross his prayer was one of forgiveness, not only forgiving the 'Good Thief' who was crucified beside him but all of us. St Luke tells us how when Jesus was in a certain place praying one of his disciples said, 'Lord, teach us to pray.' Jesus gave his disciples those sublime words, OUR FATHER..... As we keep this Holy Year and unite in love with one another, let us meditate on these words that Jesus has given us. We turn to God as his son or daughter. We pray that his kingdom of love and peace may live in our hearts. We pray that we be forgiving as Jesus is.

ASSISTED DYING BILL At the end of November MPs voted in favour of the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill. The Catholic bishops of England and Wales expressed dismay. Our own, Archbishop, Mark wrote the following:

The Passing of this bill is deeply disappointing and indicates a worrying trend of how we look out for the most vulnerable in our country, especially those with disabilities, the sick and the elderly. I hope that with further reflection our society will recognize this is not the way to go. The Church has long supported palliative care, teaching that assisted suicide and euthanasia — which both involve the intentional taking of life — are never permissible. Withholding "extraordinary means" of medical treatment and allowing death to occur naturally can be morally permissible under Catholic teaching.

The assisted dying bill in the UK is currently at the "committee stage," meaning a group of MPs are reviewing the bill line-by-line, scrutinizing each clause and proposing amendments, after successfully passing its second reading in the House of Commons; it has not yet become law and still needs to progress through further stages in both House of Commons and the House of Lords.

The archbishop has urged the public to take action. "I urge you to write to, or email, your local MP, to express your concerns about the bill. There is information on the *Right to Life UK website*, including a guide on how to do this," he said.

Addressing the Catholic community and beyond, the archbishop quoted scripture to emphasise the Christian perspective on suffering and the sacredness of life. He says Scripture reminds us that Jesus Christ entered fully into our suffering. 'It is not as if we had a high priest who was incapable of feeling our weakness,' the letter to the Hebrews reminds us (Hebrews 4:15). Jesus knew the reality of suffering and death from the inside. He gave His life for us all," Archbishop Mark said, pointing to the transcendent meaning of life and death for Christians.

We are called to pray and to remember that "All human life is sacred. This message is not just for people of faith, but for all people of goodwill, because the proposals for physician-assisted suicide are not just contrary to the dignity and sanctity of life, they pose grave dangers to vulnerable people. Cherishing life means building a society where every person is included and the diversity of individuals is not seen as a burden."

A priest of the Plymouth diocese shared this prayer. Lord of Life, we pray today for those who are terminally ill, that they may receive the love and care they deserve and know that their life is precious even to their last breath.

We pray especially for those who are vulnerable and who may not have the support and guidance they need. We pray for families and friends, for those who accompany the sick and the dying; that they may be consoled.

We pray for those who care for the dying; may they be strengthened and encouraged in their work. We pray for those elected to serve us in parliament; pour out your Holy Spirit upon them, that your wisdom and compassion may prevail in the decisions they make.

We pray for ourselves, that we may always appreciate the gift of life in all its great and beautiful variety. Help us never to take it for granted, but to be grateful for what we have received from you.

Heavenly Father, author of life, we place our cares in your loving hands today and always. We make this prayer through Christ our Lord. Amen.
