Dear friends, Within us all is a tension of the heart. We desire greatness, yet so often doubt that we have the capacity to achieve such greatness. In the words of Simon Peter, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man." Jesus looks beyond Simon Peter's own self-description and transforms his life in an instance. This fisherman, attentive to the words of Christ, will leave the life he knows and become a disciple of Jesus and will be entrusted with great power.

In a culture where success is often measured by relational status, financial security, and academic or career accomplishments, the possibility of leaving those behind in response to God's call seems increasingly absurd. But as a Church, we are called to receive, encourage, and cultivate the invitation of Jesus to say 'yes' to loving in a radical way, even if it makes no sense to the world.

One of the hardest things about discerning a vocation to the priesthood or religious life is that those closest to us can fail to comprehend it. The people who have known us since we were a babe in arms, suddenly don't understand us so well anymore. Paradoxically, vocational discernment has everything to do about discovering who you really are. It's about discovering true happiness in your life and the ways in which God continues to call men and women to serve him through service to others.

Be warned, though. Exploring your vocation is an adventure and challenge. Jesus is not content to have us stand by the shore. He wants us - he wants you - to head out to deep waters. To ride the storm with all its power and might and to come through it transformed and ready to help bring the nets in.

CANONIZATION

Shortly after Easter Pope Francis will canonize Carlo Acutis. Carlo will join the long list of men and women across the centuries whom the Church declares a saint. From its earliest days, the Catholic Church has celebrated the memory of some of her members known for heroic examples of faith, hope and charity, and has acknowledged the outstanding holiness that existed in them.

The first Christians heralded as saints were those who suffered martyrdom and were killed in hatred of the faith. In subsequent generations, the church held up as saints those who modelled heroic Christian living. For centuries before there was a process for canonization, saints were declared by popular acclaim. But through the centuries, a process for naming saints developed and was codified. In 1983 Pope St. John Paul II overhauled the process, and the result is what guides the church today.

A specific procedure is followed to prove that the person in question is in heaven. The canonization process depends first upon the popular appeal of the holy person. Is the individual one to whom others turn for inspiration? Is he or she sought as an intercessor by the faithful for helping to secure divine intervention amid life's problems? If so, a "cause" be established for the must an individual's canonization to process of advance.

The person's holy life must be a source of inspiration to the faithful, and the person should be petitioned through prayer for intercession in various needs and occasions. As the person's fame spreads and devotion to him or her increases, a thorough examination of the holy person's life is conducted. The investigation happens first at a local level — usually overseen by a diocese or religious community.

The cause proceeds according to one of three paths: the person is proven to be a martyr, the person is proven to have lived a life of heroic virtue, or the person is proven to have prematurely offered up his or her life in an act of supreme charity. Two proven miracles attributed to the person's intercession are needed for non-martyrs to be canonized, while only one miracle is needed for a martyr's canonization. It is the miracles that occur after the person's death that give evidence to his or her intercessory closeness to God as a heavenly denizen. Authenticating alleged miracles are subjected to thorough investigations by medical and theological experts.

Canonization is a declaration that the individual is in heaven and enjoys the beatific vision. The canonization takes place in a liturgy celebrated by the pope. It is an infallible act of the magisterium that is to be definitively held by the faithful that an individual is now a "saint." Fr James
